

In Connecticut, the first Catholic school was founded in 1830 in the basement of the Church of the Most Holy Trinity in Hartford. Today, there are 63 schools in the Archdiocese with over 15,000 students. We believe that *excellence* is at the heart of our schools and builds tomorrow's generation of leaders who understand what it means to persevere, to be selfless, and to seek justice.

The **2013 Annual Report** highlights the many ways Catholic schools in the Archdiocese strive for excellence.

During my school visits, I consistently see students demonstrating what it means to have Christian character, moral values and faith. We are thrilled with the 100% high school graduation rate and the 98% of students who continue on to some form of higher education. We are grateful for the dedicated educators whose students rank one to three years above grade level on standardized testing. We are committed to educating and forming the whole child, and our Catholic school athletic programs teach principles of fair play, sportsmanship, and honest competition. In our ministerial plan, **20†20 Vision: An Eye on Our Future**, we affirm that an excellent Catholic



school understands itself as a center of evangelization and catechesis; clearly articulates Gospel values, relevant standards, and 21st century fluencies; exercises responsible decision making and fidelity to mission; and engages the entire Catholic community.

Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford are exceptional religiously and academically. We are committed to maintaining and nourishing that excellence despite the changing state demographics and the reduction

or exclusion of financial resources from the Connecticut and federal governments. Together, with the Archbishop, Priests, Educators, School Boards, and other faithful stakeholders, we plan to look toward new and innovative ways for reallocating resources in order to maintain the momentum of excellence that has been at the heart of Catholic school education since its inception.

East Catholic High School, Manchester

More than 45,700 nutritious meals were put together with love as the entire East Catholic community gathered for a day of service in May to help feed children living in Uganda as part of the Feeding Children Everywhere program. The idea came from Grace Mazzarella '15 who had participated in the program with her Confirmation class.







Adult Faith Formation: At the 2013 Catholic Educators Faith Conference in March, 37 educators received certificates in Adult Faith Formation.



St. Anthony, Bristol: As they traditionally do during Lent, students at St. Anthony School in Bristol celebrated the Living Stations of the Cross. The entire school reenacted the last hours of Jesus' journey to give his life for the salvation of humankind.





St. Mary – St. Michael, Derby:

In December, eighth grade students helped to distribute food to the needy while working with the Connecticut Mobile Food Bank. Over 200 clients were served that day, as the students put their faith into action.

Excellence in Academics

St. Stephen School, Hamden

St. Stephen School Wildcat Wizards won "Best Inspiration" at the First LEGO League Connecticut Local Tournament on November 23rd in Wolcott. The team was invited to compete in the state tournament in December 2013. This year, the LEGO Robotics team is working with the theme of natural disasters and how to "Prepare, Stay Safe and Rebuild."





Our Lady of Mount Carmel School, Meriden

At Our Lady of Mount Carmel School in Meriden, students in grades 6-8 participate in a one-to-one iPad program. Students are learning and utilizing 21st century skills such as critical thinking, collaboration, and communication. The program began in 2011 with a pilot program with only the 8th grade students, and has grown to encompass the entire school. Presently, all students have iPad accessibility on a 1:1 basis rotating through the grades, enabling teachers to integrate innovative technology strategies throughout the curriculum. This successful program provides students with a useful tool to enhance their academic experience.

East Catholic High School, Manchester

East Catholic's History Bowl Team took first place in the Connecticut History Bowl Championship. East also sent two teams to the National History Bowl Championship in April in Washington, D.C. and Arlington, VA.

St. Thomas the Apostle School, West Hartford

During the month of November, Kindergarten students at St. Thomas the Apostle School learned how members of the armed services help others in our country and around the globe. The teachers read stories to the children about the different branches of the armed services and how each group serves our country and helps people in different ways. Teachers and students incorporated their study of the subject into multiple areas of the curriculum: Religion, art and literacy.



Our Lady of Mercy School, Madison

Year after year, outstanding teams from Our Lady of Mercy School in Madison successfully participate in the Mock Trial Program, an exciting law-related education program which introduces students to the American legal system and provides a challenging opportunity for personal growth, high achievement,



the demonstration of critical thinking, and teamwork. Eighth graders play roles as witnesses, attorneys, bailiffs, researchers, and court reporters. Students approach each case with a commitment to excellence, a strong level of dedication, preparedness, organization, and analytical thinking skills, and they are annually rewarded for their efforts.



Northwest Catholic High School, West Hartford

Northwest Catholic launched its Mandarin language program in the 2012-2013 school year – the 4th language offered at the school, joining Spanish, French and Latin. Course offerings in the Chinese program will expand in the years to come.

St. Bridget School, Cheshire

St. Bridget School in Cheshire offers a team

teaching approach to the teaching of middle school math. Accelerated and standard courses are offered for 6th, 7th and 8th grade students and include algebra readiness, pre-algebra, algebra, and geometry. In addition, the school sponsors a Math Counts Team which participates in an annual state wide competition. Students who graduate from SBS are well prepared to take on the challenges of high school math.

St. Brigid School, West Hartford

St. Brigid School's science program emphasizes problem solving, analysis, research, writing and communication skills, incorporated into earth, life, and physical science course work. Projects and activities are developed to engage students' minds and to reinforce important literacy and mathematics skills. Laboratory experiments and science fair projects strengthen teamwork and cooperative learning. Students learn through a scientific method that science is indeed fun!

Catholic high schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford are proud to graduate 100% of their seniors, and to send 97% of them on to college and future academic success. The following data demonstrates the exceptional educational opportunities available to our Catholic high school students:



- Service hours donated by our Catholic high school students: approximately 102,462 hours to over 900 organizations








Students in the high schools within the Archdiocese of Hartford take the SAT[®] annually, and the graph below reflects the consistently high overall student achievement that exceeds public school students both in the state of Connecticut and nationally.



All elementary schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford take the norm referenced standardized test Iowa Assessments[®] in grades 3-7. The graph below reflects the consistent high performance of these students based on national norms. On average, students achieved one to three+ years above grade level.

Superintendent's Summa Scholars

At a special ceremony on April 29, thirty-seven students from eight of the nine Catholic high schools in the Archdiocese were honored with the Superintendent's Summa Scholar Award in recognition of their superior academic performance. Dr. Dale R. Hoyt, Superintendent of Catholic Schools, recognized each student personally for their academic excellence, and each student honored the teacher they considered most influential to their success.



St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Award

The St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Award, presented each year to an individual volunteer who has made an outstanding contribution to an elementary school advancement program in the Archdiocese of Hartford, was awarded to Arthur Gerckens of St. Mary – St. Michael School in Derby during the annual HOPES Dinner on September 22.





Distinguished Elementary School Pastor

The Rev. Shawn T. Daly, Pastor of Corpus Christi Parish in Wethersfield, was named the 2013 – 2014 Archdiocesan Distinguished Elementary School Pastor. Fr. Daly was also recognized nationally with the Distinguished Pastor Award by the National Catholic Educational Association (NCEA). As Pastor of this National Blue Ribbon School, Fr. Daly is a positive advocate for the school, an enthusiastic presence, a careful financial steward, and a true spiritual shepherd. He was presented with the Archdiocesan award on January 26 and will receive the national honor at the annual NCEA convention in April.

Distinguished Catholic School Administrator

Cary Dupont, President and Chief Administrator of St. Paul Catholic High School in Bristol, was named the 2013 – 2014 Distinguished Catholic School Administrator. Cary also received national recognition with the Educational Excellence Award from the National Catholic Educational Association (NCEA). An alumnus, alumni parent, and former school board member of St. Paul, Cary was appointed President in 2007 and has since effected a renaissance of the school in a number of key areas: Catholic identity, academics, enrollment, finances, and alumni and public relations. Excellence in Athletics



Sacred Heart High School, Waterbury

Sacred Heart High School's Girls Swim/Dive Team put a championship exclamation point on a 13-0 regular season in November, winning the Naugatuck Valley League title in a romp at Kennedy High's John Reardon Pool. Sacred Heart totaled 853 points to outdistance Torrington (684), Naugatuck (585), and Watertown (566).

East Catholic High School, Manchester

East Catholic High School's Boys Tennis Team won the Class S State Championship on Saturday, June 1st at Conard in West Hartford against Weston High School, ending their 11 year-run.

This is the 50th State Championship win for East Catholic High School.

St. Joseph School, Meriden

Nearly 70 students at St. Joseph School in Meriden participate in BOKS, a 30 minute beforeschool physical activity program that aims to enhance academic performance and the overall health of kids. BOKS is held two mornings a week and it



teaches children to build healthy minds and healthy bodies. The program not only promotes physical activity and proper nutrition, but emphasizes the skills needed to work as a team to accomplish a set goal.



Northwest Catholic High School, West Hartford

The Northwest Catholic Varsity Girls' Tennis team became the first Girls' Tennis team in school history to post a 16-0 record and qualify as the # 1 seed in the Class S State Tournament. This team was also the school's first Girls' Tennis team to send #1 and #2 singles players and #1 and #2 doubles teams to the state tournament – the most a school can send. The school also had

three All-Americans – Jessica Fontaine '13 and Cathy Higgins '13 in Girls' Soccer and Sarah Gillespie '13 in Girls' Indoor Track.

St. Paul High School, Bristol

A group of seven St. Paul Performing Arts students traveled to New York City to participate in *Broadway Next*, an exciting 3-day musical theater workshop. The students learned how to audition, rehearse and perform with a faculty of top-level, working Broadway professionals. Prior to a performance of Wicked, they had the honor of performing in the famous Gershwin Rotunda for the entire audience!



St. Rita School, Hamden

The hills surrounding Hamden were alive with *The Sound of Music* in March as the superb theatrical program at St. Rita School produced this classic musical. The theater production was a wonderful experience for the middle school students who truly embraced the heart of the musical directed by Mrs. Julie Mountcastle. St. Rita School proudly presents a well-known musical each year as part of their exceptional extracurricular program, including productions such as *Annie, Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat*, *Bye, Bye Birdie*, and the upcoming *Godspell*.

Connecticut Federation Of Catholic School Parents Report 2013

- → School Bus Funding: The Legislature's Appropriations Committee proposed in April to cut \$3M from the state funding for Catholic school buses. In late April and May, we fought hard – arm-in-arm with our parents, teachers and administrators – to convince the Legislature and Governor Malloy's office to restore the \$3M back into the state budget before the budget was finalized in late May. Fortunately, we succeeded in having the funding restored.
- → Senate Bill 906 Wages for Catholic School Teachers. In April, we learned that some of our schools had legal issues with the manner in which our teachers were being paid during the summer months, so we decided to file an emergency amendment (onto the existing bill, Senate Bill 906) to have the law clarified to allow Catholic schools to enter agreements with our teachers for wage payments during the summer. Our amendment was passed onto Senate Bill 906 and the amended bill was signed into law by Governor Malloy.
- → Uniform School Calendar Task Force Legislation We succeeded in convincing legislative leadership to invite a representative of the Catholic schools to serve on the Task Force that is currently studying uniform school calendars.
- Pesticides at High Schools The Federation worked hard to oppose and help defeat two separate legislative proposals (House Bill 6385 and Senate Bill 981) that would have prohibited any high school from using any sort of pesticide products on its athletic fields. This legislation will certainly re-appear in 2014.
- → School Security As part of the Gun Safety legislation enacted in 2013 (Public Act 2013-3), the legislature established a grant program for towns to obtain reimbursements for school security measures (cameras, alarms, locks, etc.). During the session, we respectfully requested Governor Malloy and the Legislature to expand the program to include Catholic schools into the security grant program. As of this time, we have not yet been included, but the Federation will keep pushing hard!


