SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends of Catholic Schools:

It is judicious at regular intervals to share with our stakeholders a report on the status of Catholic school education in the Archdiocese of Hartford. This report highlights significant activities occurring in 2014 and looks forward with optimism, confident that Catholic schools in this Archdiocese provide a place for young people to **believe**, **learn and excel**.

In 2014 we celebrated several national accolades awarded by the National Catholic Educational Association to a student, an administrator, a pastor and the Archbishop Emeritus for their scholarship and contributions to Catholic schools.

Catholic schools provide a nurturing and a safe environment where our faith is the inspiration that motivates young people to *believe*. To further foster this environment of safety, the Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford were awarded 48% of the security grant funds available to all private schools in Connecticut. Still, more support is greatly needed from the state and federal governments in support of non-public education.

Educators choose to teach in our schools because the Catholic culture provides a place that encourages academic achievement, self-discipline, personal integrity, and the opportunity to encounter the living God in Jesus Christ. Students are drawn to our schools because they are offered the outstanding opportunity to *learn* in an environment that will bear generous fruit for their future and for the wider community.

We applaud the Class of 2014 who earned a 100% graduation rate and saw 97% of its members proceeding on to higher education. In addition, students in Catholic schools continue to perform one to four years above grade equivalency on standardized tests. Clearly, the education offered in the Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford inspires students to *excel*!

We continue to proceed forward with the ministerial plan, 20+20 Vision: An Eye on our Future that charts a strong and bright path for the future of the Catholic schools in this Archdiocese. This collaboratively developed plan focuses on mission formation and evangelization, excellence in teaching and learning, leadership and governance, and operational vitality. The vision and structure of our ministerial plan provides a clear roadmap for educators as they guide students to **believe**, **learn**, **and excel**.

We are blessed by the outstanding accomplishments of 2014, and we persevere with confidence, knowing that our Church and society sorely need Catholic school education today.

HIGH SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS

Catholic high schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford are proud to graduate 100% of their seniors, and to send 97% of them on to college and future academic success.

The following data demonstrates the exceptional educational opportunities available to our Catholic high school students:

- The 2014 Catholic High School Graduation Rate: 100%
- Catholic high school graduates who pursue further education/training: 99% (includes colleges, training programs and the military)
- Catholic high school graduates continuing their education at two or four-year colleges: 97%
- Catholic high school graduates continuing their education at four-year colleges: 91%
- Scholarship dollars received by the Class of 2014: \$87,934,239
- Tuition assistance: provided at 100% of Catholic high schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford
- Tuition assistance awarded by our Catholic high schools in 2013 2014: \$11,761,815

- Service hours donated by our Catholic high school students: approximately 137,089 hours to over 800 organizations








SUMMARY CLASS OF 2014 SAT® RESULTS

The following data reflect the results of the senior class of 2014 SAT® scores. 1107 students took the SAT in their senior year of high school.

The graph below reflects the consistently high overall student achievement that exceeds public school students both in the state of CT and nationally.

The scores represent the results of their *final* sitting for the SAT, not their highest overall score. Actual scores are higher than represented in this chart.








COLLEGE & CAREER READINESS BENCHMARK

An SAT benchmark of 1550 is associated with a 65% probability of obtaining a first-year college GPA of B- or higher. Overall in CT, 47.6% of test-takers met the SAT College and Career Readiness Benchmark.

Seniors enrolled in high schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford significantly exceeded the College and Career Readiness Benchmark.





IOWA ASSESSMENT ® SPRING 2014

Each spring, students in grades 3 through 7 in the Catholic elementary and middle schools of the Archdiocese of Hartford take the Iowa Assessments.


This year, students were administered the most recent edition of the Riverside standardized test, Form E, and were compared with the newest norm group of students comprised of students from public, religious-based, and private schools nationally.

As in the past, Archdiocese of Hartford students' performance on all subtests of this battery math, reading, language arts, science, and social studies – exceeded the average score of students tested nationally.


The results at right represent data as national grade equivalencies (NGE).

A grade equivalent is a score that describes student achievement on a grade level scale. The NGE is a decimal number that describes academic performance in terms of grade level and month. For example, if a student (as a 3rd grade student) receives a NGE of 4.2 on the third grade Reading Test, this means the student scored as well as a fourth grade student in the second month of the school year if given the same third grade Reading Test.


Iowa Assessment® Spring 2014 Math Achievement

AWARDS AND HONORS

Superintendent's Summa Scholars

At a special celebration on April 30, sixty three students from eight of the high schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford were honored with the *Superintendent's Summa Award* for achieving a high caliber of scholastic excellence. To qualify for the Summa Award, students must maintain a minimum grade point average of 4.3 and a 98% average throughout four years of high school. During the event, each student presented a certificate of appreciation to the one teacher who had most inspired them during their Catholic school career. The Superintendent's Summa Award allows the Archdiocese to formally recognize both outstanding students and remarkable educators.

AP® District Honor Roll

The Archdiocese of Hartford was one of 547 school districts in the U.S. and Canada honored by the College Board with placement on the 5th Annual AP® District Honor Roll for increasing access to Advanced Placement (AP®) course work while simultaneously maintaining or increasing the percentage of students earning scores of 3 or higher on AP® Exams. Reaching this goal indicates that the Archdiocese is successfully identifying motivated, academically prepared students who are ready for the opportunity of AP®. Since 2012, the Archdiocese of Hartford has increased the number of students participating in AP® while improving the number of students earning AP® Exam scores of 3 or higher.

Schools Receiving Re-accreditation from NEASC

All of the schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford are fully accredited by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC), the same prestigious agency through which Yale and Harvard are accredited. Those schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford receiving re-accreditation in fall of 2014 include the following:

- St. Francis St. Hedwig School, Naugatuck
- St. Paul Catholic High School, Bristol

Connecticut Security Grants

Schools in the Archdiocese provide a safe environment where measures are constantly taken to insure students' security. In 2014, 31 schools received Connecticut Security Grants totaling \$770,824, allowing them to further enhance the safety of their plants and protect their students.

CONNECTICUT FEDERATION OF CATHOLIC SCHOOL PARENTS – PROGRESS IN 2014

- School Security Grant Funding SB 29: has passed favorably through the House and Senate. This means that your phone calls, emails, visits, and petitions have been heard and non-public schools will be granted access to the school security funding available to Connecticut's public schools. In 2014, 31 Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford received Connecticut Security Grants for school security totaling \$770,824.
- Neighborhood Assistance Act SB 75: Though SB 75
 successfully moved through the House and Senate, the Governor
 vetoed the increase to the cap. This means that the cap on the
 Neighborhood Assistance Act Program will remain at \$5 million
 due to budget constraints instead of increasing to \$10 million.
 The Governor did however, encourage the Legislature to propose
 the increase again during the next Legislative session.
- **Pesticides** SB 46, was successfully defeated. This bill sought to expand the ban on the use of lawn care pesticides in schools to include schools with students in grades nine to twelve inclusive. We respectfully opposed SB 46 because expanding the ban on pesticides to our high schools would increase the risk of student injury due to a deterioration of the fields, add an additional fiscal burden to pay for alternative pest management treatments, and result in a costly conversion to turf.
