I am deeply grateful to the thousands who share their time, talent, and resources to meet the needs of our young people in Catholic school education. Your prayers, volunteer work, energy, and financial support are deeply appreciated. I offer my sincere and ongoing thanks as well to Archbishop Henry J. Mansell for his faithful shepherding of Catholic schools, his financial support through the Archbishop's Annual Appeal, and his dedicated presence at Catholic school events.

Today's learners, the net generation, are prolific social communicators who tend to bare their souls online. They understand the importance of spirituality, justice and peace. Net generation students have different thinking styles, including better visual-spatial skills, and they engage in discovery learning rather than listening to information. They are less linear in their thinking and better at synthesizing information. The net generation students are tech savvy, they learn differently, and they view the world with a new lens so they require new teaching and assessment approaches. Today's Catholic schools

must be well prepared to educate the net generation of learners as we form, inform and transform this diverse body of young people into the next generation of holy men and women and global entrepreneurs.

of three million children" (Pope Benedict XVI, 2008). Catholic schools have always been faithfully committed to effectively educating students and carrying out the educational mission of the Church. There is no question that Catholic school educators are called to be faithful to the Gospel, Church teachings, and to their inherent relationship with God. While the success of Catholic school education is well documented, significant challenges are currently threatening the Church's educational apostolate: uncertainty from an economic recession, lack of state and federal support, demographic shifts, aging facilities, and increasing educational options for parents/guardians. Archbishop Henry J. Mansell

reminds us in his pastoral letter "Our Catholic schools must, without compromise, be living witnesses to the unity we have in Jesus. We must celebrate the legacy of Catholic school education and embrace a future with great confidence in our young people. We, the Catholic Church of Hartford, must mobilize ourselves to strengthen the ministry of Catholic school education, and to profess confidently that, together, we produce great people" (Common Threads, 2008).

In a world described by Pope Benedict XVI as being in the midst of an educational crisis, we in the

Archdiocese of Hartford are heeding the call to examine our mission and realize the vi-An Eye on Our Future tal role our schools play in the formation of the net generation. Last October the

Office of Catholic Schools held an Educational Forum that included delegates from all 63 Catholic schools in the Arch-

Catholic schools are called to transform lives and provide young people with an education for a lifetime. The 2012 Annual Report captures the way in which the Office of Catholic Schools serves and supports the Catholic schools within the Archdiocese of Hartford as they educate the *net generation* while cultivating excellence, transformational growth, and continued viability.





#### Iowa Test of Basic Skills Spring 2012 Grade 7 Grade Equivalency Results






#### **2012 HIGH SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS**

Catholic high schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford are proud to graduate 100% of their seniors, and to send 97% of them on to college and future academic success. The following data demonstrates the exceptional educational opportunities available to our Catholic high school students:

- The 2012 Catholic High School **Graduation Rate**: 100%
- Catholic high school graduates who pursue further education/ training: 99% (includes colleges, training programs and the military)
- Catholic high school graduates continuing their education at two- or four-year colleges: 97%
- Catholic high school graduates continuing their education at four-year colleges: 89%
- Scholarship dollars received by the Class of 2012: \$53,118,796 (\*Data from eight of the nine high schools)
- SAT Results: Class of 2012 Seniors **Archdiocese of Hartford Students**



- Tuition assistance: provided at 100% of Catholic high schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford
- Tuition assistance awarded by our Catholic high schools in 2011 2012: \$9,879,160
- National Merit Scholars in the Class of 2012 at our Catholic high schools: 19
- Service hours donated by our Catholic high school students: approximately 76,200 hours to over 600 organizations







#### **CONNECTICUT FEDERATION OF CATHOLIC SCHOOL PARENTS**

- The Budget Adjustment bill passed by the Connecticut Legislature maintained the level of funding for nursing staff and transportation services to Catholic schools.
- The Education Reform bill created 500 new school readiness slots for which Catholic schools will be eligible, and it maintained the eligibility of private and religiously affiliated school teachers for initial, provisional, and professional teacher certification.

#### **FOUNDATION FOR** THE ADVANCEMENT OF CATHOLIC SCHOOLS

\$275,528.81 in scholarship dollars was awarded to our schools on behalf of their students in the 2011 – 2012 school year by the Foundation for the Advancement of Catholic Schools (FACS), and that amount is expected to increase during the next academic year.

#### **Enrollment Management Workshops**

Schools were empowered with the training, tools, and resources necessary to develop a successful enrollment management plan.

#### **Catholic Educators Curriculum Conference**

On November 7/8, Dr. Sarah Wannemuehler, Director



of Graduate Education at Aquinas College, addressed the legal implications of technology in today's educational environment, and Archdiocesan educators presented sessions on differentiating instruction, assessment, and 21st century literacies.



On November 9, Dr. Susan Abelein, Senior Consultant for Catapult Learning; Adjunct Professor at Loyola Marymount University; and Associate Superintendent for Leadership and Recruitment for the Archdiocese of New York, presented best practices to optimize student achievement through effective professional learning communities.







#### **Adult Faith Formation**



At the Catholic Educators Faith Conference in March, Father Michael **Dolan** presented the keynote address on "Building a School of Faith." At the conference, 44 educators were recognized for having earned a certificate of adult faith formation. Another 68 educators were honored for milestone anniversaries.

The Office of Catholic Schools also continues to enhance the options for our educators by expanding the modes of delivery of the University of Dayton's adult faith formation program. Over 250 educators completed courses in adult faith formation through either the online program or in traditional classroom and blended learning experiences facilitated by Father Michael Dolan, Father William Metzler, and Father Robert Turner.

#### **CT Private School Summit**

Ian Jukes, director of an international consulting group, led the full day professional development on April 26 for Archdiocesan teachers and administrators as well as private educators in the state. He focused on the need to restructure our educational institutions so that they become relevant to the current and future needs of children. Other speakers provided best practices in meeting academically diverse learning needs, assessment data to support instruction, standard-based assessments, and constructs data collection.

#### **New Teacher Orientation**

Highly acclaimed and recognized educational specialist, Carol Scearce, President of Enlightening Enterprises, presented a full day workshop on highly effective teaching strategies to teachers new to the Archdiocese of Hartford on August 20/21.

#### Safe Environment and Safe School Training

Furthering their commitment to safety in schools, the Office of Catholic Schools sponsored 15 Protecting God's Children sessions and 11 asbestos safety training sessions to over 645 employees and volunteers serving in our Catholic schools.







#### **International Students**



Catholic Schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford enrolled 105 students from over 20 countries as full-time students in 2012. On the Feast of the Ascension, May 17, 2012 the Office of Catholic Schools hosted its first annual International Student Reception.

#### **School Board Workshops**

The significant impact of leadership and governance was



supported by workshops sponsored by the Office of Catholic Schools. "The Effective Committee-driven School Board" was facilitated by Dr. Toni Iadarola from Lauralton Hall High School, and "Shared Responsibility and Collaborative Decision Making" was presented by **Dr. Regina Haney** from the National Catholic Educational Association

(NCEA). Both programs drew the attendance of many administrators and school board members.

#### **Finance Workshop**

On September 11/12 school finance managers received best practices regarding the registration process, tuition contract issues, reminder methods for past due tuition, and the preferred methods of tuition collection. Speaker Robert Black also presented guidance on the art of collection techniques.
