### SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

I am pleased to present the 2007 Office of Catholic Schools Annual Report highlighting the many ways my office serves, guides, leads and directs those involved in the 70 Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford.

It has been a memorable and exciting year for our Catholic schools – one of which we can all be proud. The historic Educational Symposium 2007 brought together representatives from all our schools as well as national leaders in Catholic education, and our local pastoral leadership to collaborate on a groundbreaking plan for the future of our schools. This effort attracted attention from dioceses throughout the country along with that of the National Catholic Educational Association (NCEA.)

Our secondary schools continued to demonstrate their exceptional quality with an impressive 99% graduation rate and 99% of their seniors going on to pursue further education. Once again, our elementary school students performed strongly on the IOWA Test of Basic Skills with composite scores well above grade levels at every testing stage.

Seven of our schools were voted continued accreditation by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC) and four either began or completed expansion efforts. The Archdiocese of Hartford was honored to see both its Principal and Teacher of the Year receive those honors nationally for the New England region of the NCEA.

Finally, the commitment of the Archdiocese to our schools was once again underscored by the level of financial assistance it provided to them. The Archbishop's Annual Appeal alone allocated \$1,056,850 in tuition assistance to our schools, while the overall figure of Archdiocesan financial support for Catholic schools in 2007 stands at \$5,114,759.

It continues to be our goal to raise the bar of excellence and pursue creative new opportunities for the schools in this Archdiocese. We value working in collaboration with Archbishop Henry J. Mansell, the auxiliary bishops, priests, deacons, religious men and women, administrators, teachers, school boards, and parents to provide our students with the very best education possible.

I ask for your prayers and support in our shared quest to continue making 21<sup>st</sup>- century Catholic school education academically excellent and faith-centered.

### “Common Threads” EDUCATIONAL SYMPOSIUM 2007

March 28, 2007 was an outstanding day for the Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford. For the first time in the history of our school network, over 350 delegates gathered for the Educational Symposium 2007 to learn, to share, to be inspired and challenged, and to plan for a strong future.


A panel of four extraordinary speakers shared the national perspective with attendees in the four core value areas central to Catholic school education: Dr. Timothy Cook, Director of Secondary Education at Creighton University in Omaha, NE spoke on the topic of **Catholic Identity**; Dr. Lorraine Ozar, Director of the Center for Catholic School Effectiveness at Loyola University, Chicago, addressed **Quality Catholic Education**; Sr. Dale McDonald, PBVM, PhD, Director of Public Policy and Educational Research for the National Catholic Educational Association, spoke on the subject of **Catholic School Accessibility**; and Larry Furey, CFRE, CPA,

Partner at The Advancement Counsel, informed the audience about **Catholic School Advancement**.

In addition to the inspiring addresses, delegates broke into small group discussion sessions to review and prioritize the belief statements and action steps identified by school focus groups as most critical to our Catholic schools. At the conclusion of these conversations, all table groups completed response forms that have been utilized in the development of the Strategic Directions Document for Catholic Schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford. Delegates enjoyed not only the opportunity to exchange insights with those from other schools, but also the chance to have a “voice” in determining the future of our Catholic schools.

The importance of the event was underscored by the attendance throughout the entire day of Archbishop Henry J. Mansell, along with his auxiliary bishops, Bishop Peter A. Rosazza and Bishop Christie A. Macaluso. Also in attendance doing research for an upcoming book on the Symposium process was Dr. Regina Haney, Executive Director of the Department of Boards and Councils of Catholic Education for the National Catholic Educational Association.

The culmination of the planning process will be the publication of the Strategic Directions Document and its accompanying Pastoral Letter. This critical document charting the future of Catholic school education in the Archdiocese of Hartford was promulgated at a special Mass on January 27, 2008 at the Cathedral of St. Joseph.

# Academic Excellence



## 2006-2007 HIGH SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS

Data collected from the high schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford indicates that our secondary schools continue to do an exceptional job of educating our youth and preparing them for the future.

Since last year, we have seen increases in the number of students honored as National Merit Scholars, Advanced Placement Scholars, Governor's Scholars and National Honor Society members.

In addition, the percentage of graduates pursuing further education has increased to an astonishing 99%, and the amount of scholarship dollars received by the Class of 2007 increased by a margin of over \$3.5 million dollars.

- ❖ **2007 Graduation Rate** from our Catholic High Schools is an impressive **99%**.
  - ❖ The percent of Catholic high school graduates who pursue **further education/training** is an outstanding **99%** (includes four-year colleges, two-year colleges, training programs and the military.)
  - ❖ The Class of 2007 at our Catholic high schools received **\$22,464,120 in scholarship dollars**.
  - ❖ All Catholic high schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford consider it a priority to provide tuition assistance to students in need.
  - ❖ Our Catholic high schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford distributed over **\$5,138,000 in tuition assistance** during the 2006 - 2007 school year.



## SAT - Spring 2007 College Entrance Exam

During the 2006-2007 school year, 1,162 college bound students of the nine Catholic high schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford took the SAT Reasoning Test™ as part of the college admissions process. The SAT uses a scaled score of 200-800.

The average SAT score of students attending Catholic high schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford is above both the state of Connecticut and the national average in all three tested areas.

Significant differences are reflected in the scores in all three areas as well as dramatic growth from 2006 to 2007.

## ITBS Average Grade Equivalent Scores


Average grade equivalents are used to measure growth. Students take the IOWA Test of Basic Skills in the seventh month of each school year and a minimum of one grade level is expected each year.

For example, the average third grader should show a grade equivalent score of at least 3.7 (third year, seventh month) to indicate he/she is targeted on grade level. A fourth grader should then show at least one year's growth at 4.7 (fourth year, seventh month) when he/she takes the test in the spring of fourth grade.

The chart below indicates the composite score of grade equivalents for each grade throughout the elementary and middle schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford. The scores reflect increasingly greater growth with each cumulative grade.

The *average growth* for third graders was six months above grade level; fourth graders show 1.2 grades above grade level, grades five and six show 1.5 years growth, and grade 7 shows a dramatic average of 2.2 years above grade level.

This means the average seventh grade student entered eighth grade in September of 2007 at almost a tenth grade equivalency level.



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Highlights 2007

MAJOR EVENTS

- ❖ **Secondary In-Service Program** – In March, all administrators and teachers in the Archdiocesan high schools attended a workshop at Northwest Catholic High School, West Hartford. **Dr. Sarah Wannemuehler**, from North Carolina presented, “School Law: What You Don’t Know Can Hurt You.” Teachers gained knowledge and insights regarding the importance of documentation, lesson planning, school handbooks, and important safety precautions, including Internet risks.
- ❖ **Administrators Convocation** – In August, **Dr. Adele Gonzalez** addressed the administrators at the third annual Administrators Convocation at Water’s Edge in Westbrook. Her topic was Evangelization in the Catholic Schools.
- ❖ **Elementary/Middle School In-Service Program** – In September, all the administrators and teachers in the Catholic elementary and middle schools welcomed **Dr. Wannemuehler** back for their session on School Law which was held at the Archdiocesan Center at St. Thomas Seminary.
- ❖ **Catholic Youth Spectacular** – The second Catholic Youth Spectacular, an event sponsored by several Archdiocesan agencies, was held at Quassy Amusement Park on October 14. Over 3,300 participants came to hear **Mike Patin**, a youth minister from Louisiana, and to celebrate Mass with Archbishop Mansell.
- ❖ **Catholic Educators Conference** – The annual Catholic Educators Conference was held at Saint Paul Catholic High School in October. **Mr. John Carr** of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops addressed our teachers and administrators on implementing Catholic social teachings in the curriculum.
- ❖ **The New England Chief Administrators of Catholic Education Conference**- In November, principals and marketing personnel from schools in several dioceses came to the Archdiocesan Center at St. Thomas Seminary for a conference presented by **Nora S. Murphy** who is a marketing and communications consultant. The theme for the day was **Catholic School Marketing: A Plan, Not a Puzzle**.
- ❖ **HOPES Dinner** - The 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary HOPES Dinner was held on September 23<sup>rd</sup> honoring 129 volunteers from 51 Catholic elementary and middle schools. **Dr. Karen Ristau**, President of the National Catholic Educational Association, was the outstanding and distinguished keynote speaker. The audience of over 660 guests also enjoyed a wonderful anniversary tribute video featuring many of our school volunteers and created (and graciously donated) by Rosemary Rubsam, volunteer at St. Mary, Branford.

ADVOCACY

- ❖ Archbishop Henry J. Mansell appointed **Kelley Peck** of Manchester to serve a one-year term as a Trustee for the Connecticut Federation of Catholic School Parents. Kelly has a son who attends St. Bridget School in Manchester.
- ❖ The Connecticut Federation of Catholic School Parents worked with the legislature to pass a textbook loan bill (H.B. 7351) that would make it easier for local municipalities to administer a textbook loan program. **Superintendent Dale R. Hoyt** and **Principal Rita Barry** gave persuasive testimony in support of Textbook Loans to the legislature on March 12, 2007. Three new municipalities, including Manchester and New Britain, created a textbook loan program for our Catholic schools.
- ❖ Catholic schools participated in Connecticut Catholic Schools Civics Day during which Catholic school students all across Connecticut wrote over 3,000 letters to their state legislators and to Governor Rell asking them to support Catholic schools.
- ❖ **House Speaker James Amann** provided a grant of \$150,000 to Milford’s three Catholic elementary schools. Those funds will be used for capital improvements at each of the three schools.

- ❖ **Principal Search Process, January 2007** – One of the services provided by the Office of Catholic Schools is the in-servicing of search committees when they are in need of a new principal. The manual, published in January 2007, along with a training session provided by the Assistant Superintendent, provides information and tools that assist the search committee in the process.
- ❖ **Teacher Evaluation Process, January 2007** - A new process for the evaluation of teachers was published and adopted in January 2007. The new manual and process includes more tools for teachers and administrators to use to help improve teaching and learning in the Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of Hartford.
- ❖ The Department of Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment continues to publish curriculum standards, raising the bar for academic excellence in our Catholic schools. New standards published in 2007 include Science, Social Studies, and Early Childhood Education. The department continues to address other areas of curriculum standards for publication next year.
